Report on Music. This report was read by J. Alvin Rester and adopted.

We, your Committee report as follows: That music has been in use in the Church from its very foundation. It is perfectly clear that we have in the New Testament (Mat.-26-3) "and when they had sung a hymn they went out into the Mount of Olives." (Acts-16-25) "and at midnight Paul and Silas prayed and sang praises unto God." (Col.-3-16) "Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly in all wisdom, teaching and admonishing one another in Psalms and Hymns and Spiritual songs singing with grace in your heart to the Lord." Jas.-5-13) "Is any among you afflicted? Let him pray. Is any merry? Let him sing psalms." Music is one of the greatest talents that God ever gave the human race, and should be well cultivated. For, through music we express God's Word, Love and Glory, through which souls may be inspired with the thought and love of God. We know very little of the character of the music used in the early days, but regardless of its character, we know full well that it was intended to praise and honor our God, just as music of the present day should honor God. And as we know of no better way to praise His Holy Name than in song. We urge the messengers that compose that Association to bring this important matter to the attention of their respective Churches, and see to it that each Church has at least one ten or fifteen days Singing School taught by a Godly man, as we believe no other should teach. And we further suggest that the Churches composing this Assocoation co-operate in the selection of song books to be used in the respective Churches, and that all singing teachers and song leaders stress the importance of singing in the Spirit, as so much of our present day singing is done in a colorless and unconcerned manner, without any thought of the real meaning of the words.

Report on Education and Bible Institute Work. Report read by

T. C. King and adopted.

We believe that education trains the mind and is an important factor in the developement and progress of our people; that as christians we should be alert to every opportunity to see that only christian teachers are employed in our schools. That Education and Christian Education are at opposites, and emanate from opposing forces, and that as parents, we are to the measure of our ability, responsible to our own and our neighbor's children for the kind they receive. That as a system we endorse our public schools, but we do not approve present-day schemes of Atheistic Evolutionist in their attempt to inject their dogmas and poison into our children by and through text books, and this is being done today in some ancient Historys that teach the earth to be millions of years old, and an antignity of man anti-dating the Genesis account of the creation by thousands of years. That we as Bible Baptists do all we can to elect in office such men and women as will not permit any text books to be used in our schools not in harmony with the Bible.

As to Bible Institutes, no report seems to have been made by the Committee appointed by this Association at its last meeting, and your Committee is not informed as to what if anything, has been done. However until some passable, workable and definite plan has been worked out, we recommend Institutes be held wherever and whenever same can be arranged for throughout the State under the auspices of any Church willing and able to assume the burden of careing for the preachers and any others who might attend, and that such Churches invite instructors and arrange the program accordingly, inviting the assistance and co-operation of any sister Church as they might choose. In conclusion we definitely declare for a God called Ministry, and we believe he calls whom he chooses and that we may attain valuable information and helpful instruction from man. We do not believe that any school or seminary can make a preacher.

STATEMENT OF PRINCIPLES.

1. This Association shall be known as the General Association of Baptist Churches of Mississippi.

2. The object of this Association shall be to aid in giving the Gospel men on the Co. to all men on the Gospel or New Testament plan as exemplified by the example of the Apostolic Churches such as messengers only who are in hearty sympathy are entitled to seats.

- 3. This Association shall hever exercise a particle of authority over the churches of which she is composed, or in any way interfere with their internal rights-always recognizing that to these are committed the glorious work of preaching to every creature the glad tidings of salvation and eternal life. As such, this body shall remain in subordination to the churches, never exercising any power beyond that of an advisory council.
- 4. This Association shall faithfully apply all funds she may receive from the churches, local Associations or individuals to and designated by the contributors. Also money received not specified as to its disposition shall be given to the support of preaching the gospel.
- 5. This Association shall be composed of such Baptist churches and associations of Baptist churches as choose to elect messengers to represent its annual meetings, which are in full accord with the principles for which this body stands, and this article shall not be construed to mean that the local associations shall elect messengers, but endorse those elected by the churches.
- 6. Each church is sole judge as to the qualifications of its Messengers, and each church is entitled to equal privileges in all its business transactions..
- 7. This Association may hold annual meetings with some sister Church at such times and places as may be suggested by the Messengers of the Churches.
- 8. That all things may be done in decency and in order, the Messengers of the Co-operative Churches may elect a Moderator and Assistant Moderator, a Clerk and Assistant Clerk, a Treasurer and an Auditor, to perform the duties of such office. For the purpose of service and information a committee of twelve on Finance and information to be distributed over the State as the Messengers best think advisable, as set forth by example in 2 Cor. 8th chap,, where the churches jointly chose brethren to travel, collect and dispense funds for a specific purpose, give the Churches information by visiting, preaching, writing letters and encouraging the good work to the Churches. Such committees to have no authority to appoint or otherwise control Missionarys but simply to serve the Churches if the Churches choose to use them.
- 9. The Committee on Information and Finance will inform the Churches of the needs of the Missionaries, of any Missionaries who may be appointed or endorsed by the Churches, of the amount of funds on hand. and of such Missionaries as may desire to go to the work. But this Committee will in no wise interfere with such Churches and Missionaries as may desire to work independently.
- 10. Duty of the Treasurer.—The Treasurer will receive and apply funds as designated, conduct such correspondence as his duties may require, render an annual audited report to the Messengers, in annual meeting, keep all accounts and records, turn same over to his successor and receive such

compensation for his srevices as may be suggested by the Messengers and agreed upon by the Churches

11. We suggest that all Churches and individuals contributing direct to the Missionaries on the field, report the same to the Treasurer that the amounts may be tabulated in his report

12. This Association will assist in the support of Home and Foreign Missionaries who have been appointed by one of the co-operating Churches as fully as the funds of these Churches will justify.
