The Seventy-Ninth Annual Session of the General Association met with Ocobla Regular Baptist Church, Neshoba County, October 31 to November 1, 1923.

The body met on Tuesday at 11 o'clock. Devotionals led by Brother H. C. Bufkin, reading the fourteenth chapter of John. Preaching by Brother D. W. Moulder, reading first chapter of John, text, fourteenth verse, which was uplifting and inspiring. Tuesday evening the body met and heard the report of the Executive Board, read by Brother J. W. Rooker. The Corresponding Secretary then entered into the Ministers' conference. Subjects discussed: "Has a Presbytery any Scriptural authority to refuse to ordain a person who gives sufficient evidence that he has a Divine call to the Ministry, but is deficient in literary education?" "How should a Church call a Pastor?" The discussions were led by Brothers Jas. E. Chapman and J. W. Rooker, and were very interesting.

The Association assembled with Brother L. M. Phillips, the President, in the chair. Devotional led by Brother J. S. Laird, reading the twelfth verse of the one hundred and thirteenth chapter of Psalms.

Mississippi Baptist Hospital

This institution of mercy began its work in the year of our Lord 1910, with very little accommodations for the sick and suffering. In 1912 a splendid brick building was started, and in 1921 was completed, giving room at least for seventy-five beds, besides three closed porches, giving quite a bit more room if needed. This institution is thoroughly equipped with every modern convenience. All reputable physicians and surgeons are allowed and invited to bring their patients to this hospital for treatment.

Our surgical and medical staff can not be excelled anywhere.

Our hospital extends congratulations to all of our W. M. U.'s and other church organizations for their splendid gifts in boxes, linens and towels, and prayerfully ask for a continuation of the same. We have, since our last report, treated 1,671 patients, 210 of whom were treated free.

The hospital has no funds with which to care for charity patients except the profit made upon pay patients, which fact prevents us from taking many free patients. We have 25 splendid young women preparing themselves for this God-given task, as the Good Samaritan did.

In conclusion, we heartily recommend the Baptist Memorial Hospital, located at Memphis, Tenn. It has, and is, doing a great work. Her doors are open day and night to the sick and suffering.

Report of Committee on Missions

We, your Committee on Missions, report as follows: Our mission work is only carrying out the great commission of our Lord to "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature." This makes the whole world the field, and every creature the object. Wherever there is a lost person, that is mission ground. This work is divided into three parts—State, Home and Foreign—for convenience sake.

State Missions—This work is confined to our State, which represents the Judea of the commission. This work is being done by the Baptist State Convention and the General Association. We are glad to know that the whole State is now covered, but not as thoroughly as it demands. From 1791 we have grown from one church to 1,547 in 1922. Our collections have reached near the million dollar mark. There are more Baptists today in Mississippi than were in all the world a century ago. We are outstripping all other denominations in the state.

Home Missions—This work covers the whole of the territory of the Southern Baptist Convention, also Panama and Cuba. It is under the direction of the Home Mission Board, appointed by the Southern Baptist Convention. The greater part of this work is in co-operation with the various State Mission Bodies. Annual Report of the Executive Board

We, the Executive Board of the General Association, report as follows to the General Body:

Dear Brethren: According to your instruction we have gone forth to accomplish what we could in the name of our Master. We have found our task a great, but pleasant one. We have gone sowing with tears, and have reaped with joy. Our work is in as good condition as could be expected under the prevailing circumstances. We have been pushed back entirely into the interior of the country. Our churches as a rule are poor and undeveloped. Yet we are making some progress. We are proud to say that every request for help,

either by organized church or open mission fields, has been met. We have been doing work this year at thirty-two points. Some were for only one quarter, some for three quarters and others for the entire associational year. There have been twenty workers on our pay roll for part or whole time. These missionaries have worked 492 days, traveled 7,222 miles, preached 559 sermons, baptized in their work 118 persons. Received by letter, 57; restored, 7, and collected for personal service, \$688.75, for other purposes, \$468.82, for mission, \$114.90, and raised and spent in building and improving church houses, \$2,645.50. One church has been organized. We have aided in repairing or painting three church houses through our church building committee.

We would recommend that the work of the General Association be continued in as large a way as the means in hand will permit, and that we ask the Home Board of the Southern Baptist Convention to continue their co-operative

work with us.

We need to be able to utilize our forces more. James says, "Be ye doers of the word, and not hearers only, deceiving your own selves." To be a doer of the word we must know the word.

We have Christian schools whose business it is to teach God's word and its precepts to those who attend them. Mississippi Baptists have four of these schools under their direct supervision, viz.: Mississippi College, located at Clinton, Miss.; Clark Memorial College, at Newton, Miss., and The Woman's College at Hattiesburg, Miss., and Blue Mountain College at Blue Mountain, Miss. The object of these schools is to develop each pupil into men and women whose lives will be felt for good in their life's work.

Second, Immediately after calling the body to order, the Moderator to appoint a committee on digest of letters, to whom all letters should be handed that messengers' names may be enrolled, also a Finance Committee be appointed.

Third, That this Association extend its hearty thanks to the people of Ocobla Baptist Church and community for their kindness and hospitality during the sitting of the As-

Fourth, That the Recording Secretary have 1,000 copies of Minutes printed for distribution.

Fifth, That Recording Secretary be allowed \$35.00 for his services, and that he draw on the Treasurer for salary and expense of printing and mailing.

On motion that the Association be dismissed with prayer led by Brother Jas. E. Chapman.

ARTICLE 1-This Association shall be known by the name of CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE 1—This Association shall be known by the name of ARTICLE 2—The object of this Association shall be Domestic Missions in Mississippi, Indian Missions amongst us in the Territories of the West, Foreign Missions in all parts of the world, the cause of education generally, and especially to the poor brethren preparing for the Gospel Ministry, and other works of Christian benevolence.

ARTICLE 3—Every church co-operating with and contributing

ARTICLE 3—Every church co-operating with and contributing to the objects and works of this Association, shall be entitled to membership as follows, viz: Churches to have one representative until their membership reaches fifty, then two until it reaches one hundred, and then three, and no more. Associations to have one messen-

ger to every hundred communicants, provided no one entitled to a seat who is not a regular Baptist in good standing. Provided, further, that any regular Baptist in good standing, making individual contribution to any object fostered by the Association, shall be entitled to a seat as messenger, if he so desires.

ARTICLE 4-This Association shall never possess a single attribute of power or authority over any church or Association. It absolutely and forever disclaims any right of this kind, avowing the cardinal principles ever dear to Baptists—that every church is sovereign and independent.

ARTICLE 5-The officers of this Association shall be President, two Vice-Fresidents, Corresponding and Recording Secretaries, and a Treasurer, to be elected by ballot or otherwise, and to discharge the duties incumbent upon such officers, and thirty directors appointed by a Committee on Nominations, all to be chosen annually, and to continue in office until their successors are duly qualified.

ARTICLE 6-These officers, together with directors, shall constitute a Board of Managers, with the power to transact all business for which this Association was formed during recess of same. The President to be Chairman of the Board, any five of whom with the presiding officers, to constitute a quorum. Provided in all cases of absence of any officer a protem appointment may be made, and to report annually to the Association.

ARTICLE 7—The same individual may be both Corresponding

and Recording Secretary. ARTICLE 8-The meeting of this Association shall be annual. and on Wednesday and Thursday, after the fourth Sunday in October, and at such places as may be agreed upon from time to time, the Board to meet as often as business may require.

ARTICLE 9—This Association may at any time appoint a special board on any of the objects or Christian Benevolence embraced in this Constitution.

ARTICLE 10-All monies contributed for a special object shall be faithfully applied, in accordance with the wish of the donor.

ARTICLE 11—The Constitution may be altered or amended at any time by a vote of two-thirds of the members present; provided, the Fourth Article be regarded as sacred, and can never be altered or amended.

RULES OF ORDER

1. At every sitting, business shall be opened and closed with

prayer by the President or whoever he may be.

2. Correspondence from churches and other societies and individuals friendly to the Association shall be called for, the names of delegates appointed enrolled, with a mark of absence affixed to those who were not present.

3. Visiting brethren shall be entitled to speak on all subjects.

but to vote on none.

4. The election of officers shall take place immediately after the 'delegates' names have been enrolled and the Association organizd. 5. No motion shall be discussed without it has been seconded and

reduced to writing, if requested by any member.

6. Motions made and lost shall not be recorded in the minutes,

unless so ordered at the time.

7. If any proposition or motion under debate contains two or more points, it shall be divided at the request of any member, and the

vote taken separately.

8. Every speaker shall rise and address himself to the President, and no one shall speak more than twice on any motion unless by permission of the Association.

9. The President is to judge as regards order in the discussion of subjects, except when an appeal is made to the body, which shall be done without delay or debate.

10. All committees by this body shall be nominated by the President, subject, however, to approval of the Association.
