ORPHANAGE REPORT

"The fatherless . . . which are within thy gates, shall come and hall eat and bless thee in all shall eat and be satisfied; that the Lord thy God may bless thee in all the Work and the satisfied; that the Lord thy God may bless thee in all the work of thine hand which thou doest."—Deut. 14:29.

We are deeply grateful to the Lord for all of the accomplishments ad achiever and achievements of the Orphanage and are pleased to give a report of the grant of the grant of the grant total number of children of the general work for the past year. The total number of children cared for the past year. cared for during the year was 213. Forty-nine new children were admitted, the mitted, these coming from 21 different counties. Many have gone out from the O from the Orphanage, some to live with relatives and friends who were in position in position to give them a good home. Others have completed their education and give them a good home. Others have them to make their own education to give them a good home. Others have completely own and are now employed, enabling them to make their own living. These boys and girls no longer live at the Orphanage but are frequent visitors. Ten girls and one boy completed their eighth grade course of study in our own school on the campus. This group will enter Bailey Junior High School of Jackson in the Fall. Seven girls graduated from Central High School in Jackson, two of these have entered the School of Nursing at the Baptist Hospital, one will enter Blue Mountain College, the other four will take a business course or secure positions. One of our girls will be a senior at Blue Mountain this Fall and will graduate with the class of 1944. One boy who finished his Freshman year at Mississippi College has been called to serve his country and is in the U. S. Navy, now stationed at the University of Oklahoma. You will note that we did not have any boys in our graduating class as they are being called into service as soon as they are old enough and many volunteer before reaching the age for registration. The Orphanage is proud of the long list of sons who have entered service in defense of their country. They are ready to do their bit to protect and preserve the freedoms that have made possible their protection in time of need and provided them with the opportunities of life. Many hold commissions as Second and First Lieutenants, Some fifty or more who have gone out from the Orphanage in recent years are among the number. One of our fine girls is now a Second Lieutenant in the Army Nurses Corps. As a parent and sort of foster parent of a large number from the Orphanage, great concern is felt for these young men and girls and concern for the success of this terrible enter-

prise upon which we have been forced to embark. The splendid support from our Church folk means so much to the administration. It makes it possible for us to continue to pay our bills promptly the first of each month. Under such conditions, we can naturally plan more wisely and execute our plans with more efficiency. This means our children are getting better service than ever before. The Orphanage has no indebtedness. This has been made possible because of your generous gifts on the two special days. Mother's Day and Thanksgiving and also because of the increased gifts from the Cooperative Program,

HOSPITAL REPORT

It is with thanksgiving and pleasure that we observe from this special phase of the Association work, The Mississippi Baptist Hospital, what the past year has brought to us. Let us note first our fiscal growth. In the last ten years our hospital has grown from 85 to 205 beds, making it now the largest hospital in Mississippi. We admitted to the hospital last year 7674 patients. We had only 195 deaths. Eight hundred and five babies were born within our walls. Our charity work amounted to \$52,942.71. The free work for the colored people amounted to \$52,942.71. ed to \$52,942.71. The free work for the Orphanage at a cost of \$1150.000. We cared for 90 children from the Orphanage at a cost of \$1150.000. of \$1159.90. We cared for 324 crippled children over and above what the state the state paid at a cost of \$10,747.05. We cared for 132 blind men and women and children women at a cost of \$2492.40. We cared for 87 mothers and children from the from the maternal and child health clinic at a cost of \$496.40. We have cared for the maternal and child health clinic at a cost of \$496.40. We have cared for 32 ministers which amounts to \$2382.72. We received from the Comthe Convention Board \$2042.72. We have given to armed forces 28 of our doctor. our doctors and 46 nurses. We now have 87 white student nurses and 16 colons. 16 colored nurses. Two of our girls attended the Y. W. A. assembly at Ridgeorge. Ridgecrest this summer and report a splendid convention.

Never in the history of the hospital have we served so many people. ur hospital Our hospital is crowded to the utmost at all times. While we have not turned process. turned people away, we have had to put beds in every hall and seek the cooperate away, we have had to put beds in the patients who the cooperation of our physicians in order to care for the patients who came. Our came. Our greatest need at this time is more room. May the dear Lord Put it into reach the property of the pro Put it into the hearts of those who have been blessed to give a bond to the Hearts of those who have been blessed to give a dad to the Hospital to be added to our building fund, that we may add another unit of fifty rooms as soon as the war is over.

Article 1. This Association shall be known by the name of "The Gen-

Article 3. Every church cooperating with and contributing to the objects and works of this Association shall be entitled to membership as follows, viz: Churches to have one representative until their membership reaches fifty, then two until it reaches one hundred, then three

and no more. Associations to have one messenger to every hundred communicants, provided no one entitled to a seat who is not a regular Baptist in good standing. Provided further, that any regular Baptist in good standing making individual contributions to any object fostered by the Association shall be entitled to a seat as messenger, if he so

Article 4. This Association shall never possess a single attribute of power over any church or association. It absolutely and forever disclaims any right of this kind, avowing to the cardinal principles ever dear to Baptists-that every church is soverign and independent.

Article 5. The officers of this Association shall be President, two Vice-Presidents, Corresponding and Recording Secretaries, and a Treasurer, to be elected by ballot or otherwise, and to descharge the duties incumbent upon such officers, and thirty directors appointed by a Committee on Nominations, all to be chosen annually, and so continue in office until their successors are duly qualified.

Article 6. These officers, together with directors, shall constitute a Board of Managers, with the power to transact all business for which this Association was formed during recess of same. The President to be Chairman of the Board, and five of whom with the presiding officers to constitute a quorum. Providing in all cases of absence of any officer a protem appointment may be made and it report annually to the Association sociation.

Article 7. The same individual may be both Corresponding and Recording Secretary.

Article 8. The meeting of this Association shall be annually and on Wednesday and Thursday after the second Sunday in October, and at such places as may be agreed upon from time to time, the board to meet as often as business may require.

Article 9. This Association may at any time appoint a special board on any of the objects or Christian Benevolences embraced in this constitution.

Article 10. All monies contributed for a special object shall be faithfully applied, in accordance with the wish of the donor.
