REPORT ON BAPTIST ORPHANAGE

Since October 1, 1949 our family has grown considerably. We have admitted forty-five boys and girls to make their home in the Baptist Orphanage, in addition to the number we already had. Some will stay with us to finish High School and perhaps College, but some do not stay so long. We just wish you knew each boy and girl personally and then you would realize how worthwhile your gifts are. The opening of the Pre-School age building was quite an occasion—nineteen new children were admitted April 29.

We can never thank the Lord enough for health and food, for all that we have is from above, the Giver of all good and perfect gifts. We do not know of a village the size of the Children's Village where

there has been no serious illness or deaths since October 1, 1949. That makes life worth living because we believe our Heavenly Father knows all things and is ever watching over His own.

The new School and Gymnasium, Workshop and Garage and Pre-School age building have been completed and we could not have done it without you and your help, your prayers and your time. We plan in the future to refurnish our Dining Room in the Administration Building, make repairs to buildings already completed as they are needed, refurnish and redecorate as we are able. It was necessary that we cash some Government Bonds in order to pay off the new buildings, for our income for this period of time has been very small. Our income from the Cooperative Program is now 4%. We have friends who remember us every month—Sunday School Classes, W. M. U's., Mother's Day, Thanksgiving and Christmas offerings help us out a lot too. Set aside November 19 for your special THANKS-GIVING OFFERING for the children of the Orphanage and we believe the Railroads will furnish free transportation for all produce and supples this year, as usual. HOSPITAL REPORT FOR YEAR BEGINNING JULY 1, 1949 AND ENDING JUNE 30th. 1950

We cannot help but have a deep sense of gratitude to God for his unquestionable approval on Mississippi Baptist Ministry of Christian healing.

During these 12 months our hospital has admitted 13,527 patients. With every conceivable physical and spiritual need come under the influence of our hospital, added to this is the fact that 5 to 15 love ones of each patient spends many hours within the walls of this love ones of each patient spends many hours within the walls of this hospital. No other demoninational institution directly touches the lives of so many people as does the Baptist Hospital.

During this period calls have come daily from people in need of help, but without funds to pay. It has been a source of deep sorrow that we have not been able to answer all these calls. another \$44,749.79 had been charged off, because of people who were admitted as pay patients and upon discharge were unable to pay. This is an out let of \$112,291.86 free work for the year, against a total recieved from both the mothers day offering, and the Cooperative Program of 12,749.03. We believe that if Mississippi Baptist could catch a vision of the great privilege and responsibility involved in this ministry of healing those in need, regardless of their ability to pay, it would easly be one of the most dynamic mission activities we could have any where.

Our surgical department has had it's biggest year in the history of the hospital. We have preformed each month on an average of 334 major surgical operations, and 244 minor surgical operations. Our labatory and X-Ray department have been completely remodeled and re-equipped and are now second to none in this part of the country in their technical contributions, during the year in our maturnity department there has been 1531 babies born. The present enrollment in our school of nursing is 175. In May of this year our school graduated 30 young women into the field of Christian nursing.

In closing this report, let it be said that those responsible for the operation of your hospital, covets so much the earnest prayers of Mississippi Baptist.

CONSTITUTION

Article 1. This Association shall be known by the name of "The General Association of Regular Baptist of Mississippi."

Article 2. The object of this Association shall be Domestic Missions in Mississippi, Indian Missions amongst us and in territories of the West. Foreign Missions in all parts of the world, the cause of educaton, and especially to the poor brethren preparing for the Gospel Ministery, and other works of Christian benevolence.

Article 3. Every Church cooperating with and contributing to the object and works of this Association shall be entitled to membership as follows, viz: Church to have one representative until their membership reaches fifty, then two until it reaches one hundred, then three and no more. Associations to have one messenger to every hundred communitants, provide no one entitled to a seat who is not a regular Baptist in good standing. Provided further, that any regular Baptist in good standing make individual contributions to any object fostered by the Association shall be entitled to a seat as messenger, if he so desires.

Article 4. This Association shall never possess a single attribute of power over any church or Association. It absolutely and forever disclaims any right of this kind, avowing to the cardinal principals very dear to Baptist—that every church is soverign and independent.

Article 5. The officers of this Association shall be president, two Vice-Presidents, Corresponding and Recording Secretary, and a Treasurer, to be elected by ballot or otherwise, and to discharge the duties incumbent upon such officers. and thirey directors appointed by a Committee on Nominations, all to be chosen annually, and to continue in office until their successors are duly qualified.

Article 6. These officers, together with directors, shall constitute a Board of Managers, with the power to transact all business for which this Association was formed during recess of same. The presiding officer a protem appointment may be made and it reported annually to the Association.

Article 7. The same individual may be both Corresponding and Recording Secretary.

Article 8. The meeting of this Association shall be annually and on Wednesday and Thursday after the second Sunday in October, and at such places as may be agreed upon from time to time, the board to

meet as often as business may require.

Article 9. This Association may at any time appoint a special board on any of the objects on Christian Benevolences embraced in constitution.

Article 10. All monies contributed for a special object shall be faithfully applied, in accordance with wish of the doner.

Article 11. The Constitution will be altered or amended at any time by a vote of two-thirds of the membership present, provided the Fourth Article be regarded as sacred, and can never be altered or amended.

RULES OF ORDER

1. At every sitting, business shall be opened and closed with prayer by the President or whoever he may appoint.

2. Correspondance from churches and other societies and individuals friendly to the Association shall be called for, the names of delegates appointed enrolled with the mark of absence affixed to those who were not present.

3. Visiting brethern shall be entitled to speak on all subjects, but to vote on none.

4. The election of officers shall take place immediately after the delegates names have been enrolled and the Association organized.

5. No motion shall be discussed without it has been seconded and reduced to writing if required by any member.

6. Motions made and lost shall not be recorded in the Minutes, unless so ordered at the time

7. If any proposition or motion under debate contains two or more points, it shall be divided at the request of any member, and the vote taken separately.

8. Every speaker shall rise and address himself to the president and no one shall speak more than twice on any motion unless by permission of the Association

9. The president is the judge as regards order in the discussion of subject, except when an appeal is made to the body, which shall be done without debate or delay.

10. All Committees by this body shall be nominated by the President, subject, however, to approval of the Association.
